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Impact of COVID-19 on apatient with obsessive compulsive disorder

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Abstract

Since COVID-19 was announced as a pandemic by WHO with a strict emphasis on hand washing and disinfection, various media have focused on the suffering of patients with Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder (OCD). In the eyes of the general population, those with (OCD) are viewed as germophobic patients and extreme cleaners who compulsively wash their hands. In other words, the high level of heterogeneity and selectivity both across and within symptom subtypes is incongruent with the notion that COVID-19 is always directly relevant to OCD.
